It will facilitate matters if you show your MSU number (shown on address label) along with your name and address. If the inside of the outer wrapper is blank that means that your dues are paid and you are in good standing until a subsequent end of volume year.

An Editorial

Way back in early Spring it was made known that the U.S.P.S. would issue a series of stamps to commemorate the 200th birthday of our Country. The first of the series was to be issued July 4, 1971, and was to depict a battle scene of the American Revolution.

Immediately your editor went to work writing letters to various Masonic Philatelists, Masonic Libraries, etc, to determine if the first battle had any Masonic connection. Bro. Marshall Loke was also contacted and after due research it was determined that no obvious Masonic connection could be made with the proposed stamp.

On July 4, 1971, the stamp was unveiled and wow, what a "label". After seeing this strange looking abstract design, your editor was indeed happy that no Masonic connection could be made with the first American Revolution stamp. It would have been an insult to the Fraternity and to our Masonic forefathers to have honored them with such a "trash". The design depicts the official emblem of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission - a white star outlined in red, white and blue rounded contours. No wonder it was not made public in advance. The stamp looks like a decal for the wingtips of model airplanes.

Why is it so necessary to honor the Commission. I have to assume that some outside political pressure caused this terrible philatelic item to be created. It seems that this tasteless design, which has no concievable meaning to the American people, was issued to satisfy the egos of the few.

Is this what we are to expect in the years ahead in commemoration of our Country's most important event? Is this a representative of the American Revolution stamps in store for us? God forbid!

I am ashamed to claim this label as a commemorative stamp to mark the beginning of our Country's birthday celebration. Of all the paintings, historical sketches and so on in our Archives, could we not find anything more suitable than that? What happened to our talented artists and designers:

To quote Kenneth A. Wood, Editor Western Stamp Collector: "If this first American Revolution Bicentennial commemorative is going to be representative of philatelic participation in this significant anniversary, then the USPS has some pretty tall explaining to do. But then, perhaps, the event crept up on our postal authorities, and they had no time to prepare commemorative stamps worthy of the event? There can be no other explanation for such a glorious opportunity being so miserably wasted."

I am proud of my Country and its heritage. I believe that my Country's 200th anniversary deserves the very best in philatelic recognition possible.

As an individual, I can do no more than voice my opinion with my Senators, Congressmen and Postal Officials. Won't you do the same?

Only the Kennedy Space Center first day cover will be sent automatically to members in the Masonic Cover Club. The Houston first day cover will be sold on a first come basis. Only a handful of these were serviced.

Masons Of British Royal Family

On page 203 of the Masonic Stamp Collector there is a small article pertaining to William Augustus and the special cancel by Great Britain for the 250th anniversary of his birth.

Bro. Allan Evans, Wooloowin, Qld., Australia, furnished the following additional interesting facts, not only on William Augustus, but on several other Masons of the British Royal family as well:

Some 23 Princes of the British Royal family have been members of the Craft since 1737, eight of whom honoured Freemasonry by accepting the office of Grand Master. In fact, English Freemasonry has had royal Grand Masters during the 134 years in all. Two sons of King Goerge II were Freemasons (he had 8 sons all told), FREDERICK LEWIS, 15th Prince of Wales (1707-1751), eldest son of George II, was the first English Prince to be initiated after the formation of the premier Grand Lodge. It took place in 1737 at an occasional Lodge, held in the Palace of Kew, which was presided over by Dr. Desaguliers. At the April meeting of the Grand Lodge the following year, he was referred to as "our Brother H.R.H. the Prince of Wales". Among his other titles, it may be noted that he was the 1st Duke of Edinburgh, although this was then spelled Edenburgh.

Prince <u>WILLIAM AUGUSTUS</u>, Duke of Cumberland (1721-1765), third son of George II was initiated (according to Gould) in a Military Lodge in the British Army in Belgium in 1743 (he was a British General. Among his several defeats in battle, he was beaten by the French at Fontenoy in 1745. He did, however, have one victory, when he quelled the Jacobite rebellion of 1745/6 by winning the Battle of Culloden).

Three of the sons of FREDERICK LEWIS (mentioned above), namely The Duke of Yprk, the Duke of Gloucester and the Duke of Cumberland were Freemasons (Prince Edward Augustus, Prince William Henry, and Prince Henry Frederick respectively).

Six of the seven sons of King George III were Freemasons - GEORGE AUGUSTUS FREDERICK, Prince of Wales, eldest son, Prince FREDERICK AUGUSTUS, Duke of York, second son; Prince WILLIAM HENRY, third son and later King William IV; Prince EDWARD AUGUSTUS, fourth son; Prince ERNEST AUGUSTUS, fifth son, later Duke of Cumberland and later King of Hanover; and AUGUSTUS FREDERICK, later 1st Duke of Sussex, sixth son of George III. The two in particular who are shown on stamps are these:

GEORGE AUGUSTUS FREDERICK, 1762-1830, Prince of Wales, later King George IV 1820-1830, shown on recent stamp of Barbuda. Initiated in a special Lodge convened for that purpose by command of his proposer and uncle the Duke of Cumberland, Grand Master, at the Star and Garter Tavern Pall Mall London on 6th Febr. 1787; his seconder was the 1st Duke of Norfolk. The following day his initiation was reported in Grand Lodge, and it was resolved that he be a member of Grand Lodge; he was presented with an apron lined with blue silk and seated immediately on the right of the Grand Master. In 1790 he was elected Grand Master, but did not appear in Grand Lodge as such until 2nd May 1792, when he was installed and invested. Lord Rawdon was appointed acting Grand Master in 1790. On 2nd December 1805 he was elected Grand Master and Patron of the Craft in Scotland, and was re-elected until his accession to the throne as KING GEORGE IV in 1820. He then signified that he would have great satisfaction in continuing to be Patron of the Ancient Order of St. John's Masonry in Scotland.

Just before the United Grand Lodge of England was formed, he resigned as Grand Master of England, and became Patron and Protector of the Order. PRINCE OF WALES LODGE NO. 259 was constituted in 1787, under the patronage and protection of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales and consisted wholly of brethren honoured with appointments under H.R.H. or men "firmly attached to H.R.H.'s person and interests". In founding it, a Royal Medal was approved, to be worn by members out of the Lodge as well as in it. In 1834, members were privileged to wear an apron with a narrow internal border of garter blue to commemorate the fact that KING WILLIAM IV was Worshipful Master when he ascended the British throne in 1830.

PRINCE WILLIAM HENRY, 1765-1837, third son of George III, later KING WILLIAM IV, is also shown on a recent stamp of Barbuda as well as other earlier stamps. He was initiated on 9th March 1786 in Prince George Lodge No. 86 in Plymouth. Next year, he was appointed Past Grand Master. He joined the Prince of Wales Lodge No. 259 on 30th May 1789. Next year, he was appointed Grand Superintendent of Gibraltar and Patron of Royal Arch Masonry. On 28th February 1828, he was installed as Worshipful Master of Prince of Wales Lodge by the Grand Master. He wascreated Dukeof Clarence in 1789, and following the death of his elder brother (George Iv) he ascended the throne in 1830 as KING WILLIAM IV. He commanded his younger brother the Duke of Sussex to take the Prince of Wales Lodge under his protection, and to preside over it as Master. A special apron was instituted, which the Grand Master granted on 13th December 1830. As King William IV, he accepted the title Grand Patron of Freemasons in England, Ireland and Scotland.

Ed. note: Thank you Bro. Evans for submitting the above interesting facts on the British Royal family. The Scott Numbers of Barbuda stamps depicting the above are not known at this time. Will provide these next issue.

Wm. V. S. Tubman - Prince Hall Mason

resident of Liberia. He was a member of Mesurado Consistory in Monrovia, Liberia, West Coast of Africa. President Tubman had been Most Worthipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Prince Hall Masons of Liberia and a Deputy of the United Supreme Council, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Prince Hall affiliation, Southern Jurisdiction, U.S.A. He had also been Commander in Chief of Mesurado Consistory.

President Tubman was coronated a Sovereign Grand Inspector General (Active 33rd Degree Mason) in 1954. Stamps: Liberia - Scott #555-556.

· Roald Amundsen

On June 23 Norway issued a single 100 ore stamp to mark the 10th anniversary of the entry into force of the Antarctic Treaty. The stamp bears a portrait of Roald Amundsen, the first man to reach the South Pole, and the emblem of the treaty. In 1903-06 navigated the northwest passage and fixed the position of the North magnetic pole. He disappeared in June 1928 on flight to rescue Nobile who was lost returning from North Pole.

Amundsen is said by several sources to be a Mason but no lodge ever specified.

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
