



HORACE AUGUSTUS MOSES

Horace Augustus Moses was honored by the USPS on August 6, 1984, with the issuance a stamp to commemorate the founder of Junior Achievement in Bloomington, Ind.

Horace Moses was born on April 21, 1862, in Ticonderoga, N.Y.. After graduating from Troy Conf. Academy in Poultney, Vt., in 1881, he entered the paper manufacturing industry and remained in that field for the rest of his working career. He started with Agawam Paper Co., organized Mittineague Paper Co. in 1892, consolidated it with Woronoco Paper Co. in 1911 and then into Strathmore Paper Co. becoming Chairman of the Board. He was very interested in developing a closer relationship between the city and the country and in improving the position of the farmer. He founded and became honorary president of Junior Achievement. He made his home in the Springfield, Mass., area and died there on April 22, 1947.

Bro. Horace A. Moses was a member of Springfield Lodge, Springfield, Mass., being initiated on April 1, 1896, passed on June 10, 1896, and raised on Oct. 7, 1896. He received his Grand Lodge Veteran's Medal for 50 years membership in 1947.

Over the past ten months, there have only been a total of fourteen (14) new members added to the ranks while six (6) members have closed their albums or have officially resigned. In addition several of the members were dropped from the roles because they did not renew their membership. The bottom line is that we are losing ground in our survival techniques - we must launch an active campaign to recruit new members and/or attract back the former members.

There is still a lot of uncovered, unresearched Masonic Philatelic information in files, records and documents of the world - this was dramatically demonstrated by the new cases of Jerome Kern and Horace Moses. Further, the various postal agencies are helping by issuing stamps which picture new individuals to philately. I firmly believe that our Unit is one of the foremost research groups in our field - we must retain that importance and strive to be even better. This advancement can best be achieved by increasing the scope of activities through increased membership - with active members who can research and disseminate the information through our mediumthis newsletter. It is incumbent upon all of us to try to increase the membership through whatever means are available to us - writing articles for philatelic publications or for Masonic periodicals, speaking on the hobby at Lodge meetings or at stamp club meetings or by individually recruiting on a personal basis.



The returns measured in terms of knowledge gained show the balance is definately in favor of the member. As in past years, the Unit officers are hereby instituting a new membership contest for this coming fiscal year (1985-6). #### **ERRORS**

There were two errors in the last Newsletter and its enclosure which must and will be corrected at this time:

Abraham Baldwin - The addendum portion of Denslow's "10000 Famous Freemasons corrects the error within the body of Volume I which identifies A. Baldwin as a Mason. "He was not a Mason. The "visiting" Baldwin to American Union Lodge was Col. Jonathan Baldwin." Gutzon Borglum - The article on page 454 credits Gutzon Borglum as being the sculptor of the memorial "Silence" in the Soldiers' and Sailors' Memorial Hospital at the Masonic Home in Utica, N.Y.. This figure was actually created by Augustus Saint-Gaudens for the Masonic Hall which originally stood at the corner of 23rd St. and 6th Ave. in New York City.

#### THOMAS ROBERT BUGEAUD

In 1950 the postoffice of Algeria issued a stamp on the occasion of the unveiling of a monument in honor of the generous Moslim Abd-El-Kader, the great fighter for Algeria's independence. (Scott No. B61) I don't know why his great rival, Bugeaud, the person who forced him to surrender, is on the same stamp. It is, though, a remarkable stamp when we realize that both of them were Masons.



Abd-El-Kader's membership is generally known; Bro. Marshall Loke described him excellently in "The Philatelic Freemason", Sept/Oct 1983. (It was his last article in our periodical). It is less known that his rival, Thomas Robert Bugeaud was also a member of the Fraternity. In his book "Un siècle de la Franc-Maconnerie Algérienne" (Paris 1969), the author X. Yacono relates that Bugeaud was an honorary member of a Lodge in Oran (Algeria). Bro. Fred. Zeller, Grand Master of the Grand Orient de France (1971-1973) lifted the veil completely in an article in the periodical "Eur-Africa", of October 1975, page 54:" Thomas Robert Bugeaud was a member of the Lodge "L'Union Africaine" in Oran.


Thomas Robert Bugeaud, Marquis de la Piconnerie, Marshal of France, Duke of Isly, was born October 15, 1784, in Limoges. In 1804 he enlisted as a private in the Napoleonic imperial guard of the French Army. He was one of those people of which Napoleon once said: "Every soldier carries the marshal's baton in his pack". He was a Lieutenant-Colonel when he resigned in 1815 after the fall of Napoleon. After the Revolution of 1830 he returned to the Army under Louis Philipe and was a conservative deputy throughout the July Monarchy (1830-1848). After serious set-backs of the French against Abd-El-Kader, he was sent to Algeria in 1836 and forced his rival to enter into a treaty with France. From 1840 to 1847 Bugeaud was Governor-General of the colony Algeria. Abd-El-Kader again in revolt was finally beaten on August 14, 1844, at the Isly River and Bugeaud was named Duke of Isly for this decisive victory. In 1848 Bugeaud was Commander of Paris but was unable to prevent the fall of the monarchy. After the revolution in 1848 he was elected to the new administration, the Second Republic. He died in Paris on June 10, 1849.

France had previously honored Bro. Bugeaud in 1944 on a stamp in memory of the battle at Isly. (Scott No. 497).

#### SUGAR RAY ROBINSON



There has just been released a new book "The 100 Greatest Boxers of All Times" by Bert Randolph Suger, a former editor of <u>Ring Magazine</u>. He chooses Sugar Ray Robinson as No. 1, stating: "He was boxing's version of Rashomon. Everyone saw something different: He could leliver a knockout blow going backward; he was seamless, with no fault lines; his left hand, held always at the ready, was pretty in motion; his footwork was superior to any that had been seen in boxing up to that time; his hand speed and leverage was untouchable; and on and on."

Bro. Robinson is listed in the proceedings of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of New York in 1957 as a member of Joppa Lodge No. 55. This same information is also repeated in William R. Denslow's "10000 Famous Freemasons". He is pictured on the Ajman (Non-Scott listed) issue shown above.

Sugar Ray Robinson was born Walker Smith in Detroit on May 8, 1920. As a boy he watched Joe Louis train at a local gym and resolved to become a boxer. He moved with his family to New York City where he joined the amatuer ranks, winning all 85 of his bouts and the Golden Glove featherweight and lightweight championships. For one match he borrowed the certificate of another amateur named Ray Robinson to meet the age qualifications and later added "Sugar" to his name after a sportswriter dubbed his boxing style "sweet as sugar".

He was welterweight champion from 1946 to 1951 and held the middleweight title five times between 1951 and 1960. Between 1940 and 1946 he won 73 professional bouts, losing only one - a decision to Jake LaMotta. In 1946 he outpointed Tommy Bell for the welterweight crown which he vacated in 1951 after knocking out LaMotta for the middleweight title. In that year he lost it to Randy Tarpin and then won it back. Challenging Joey Maxim for the light-heavyweight crown in 1952, Robinson seemed a sure winner on points but was overcome by heat in the 13th round and suffered a technical knockout. He retired after this bout. In a comeback bout in 1955 he knocked out Bobo Olson for his second title. In 1957-58 he lost it to, and regained it from, both Gene Fullmer and Carmen Basilio, successively. He lost twice to Paul Pender in 1960 and retired in 1965. He appeared in several films and TV shows and helped organize the Sugar Ray Youth Foundation. Robinson was elected to the Boxing Hall of Fame in 1967.

# JUAN JOSE CANAS

1826-1900

Unfortunately I cannot tell you much about the biography of this Central American officer. I could not find his name in any encyclopedia, not even in the great "Diccionario enciclopedico", issued in Mexico and directed to Latin America. My only source in this respect is the stamp. It reveals that he was a general and "Autor de la latra del Himno Nacional", poet of El Salvador anthem, for which he was honored by the Republic of El Salvador on a stamp in 1945 (Scott No. 590). This information indicates he was a good patriot and a faithful servant of his country.

More is known about his Masonic activities. After Priest Francisco Calvo had founded the first Lodge in Costa Rica in 1865, Freemasonry expanded over the whole of Central

America; General Canas played an important part in this growth. On September 30, 1871, Juan Jose Canas was one of the founders of the Lodge "Progresso" No. 5 in San Salvador on a patent of the "Gran Oriente Centro Americano" with a seat in San Jose, Costa Rica. As a member of this Lodge, Canas participated in the founding of the Lodge "Excelsior" No. 17 in San Salvador on March 3, 1882. On August 2, 1882, he was a party to the founding of the Lodge "Caridad y Constancia" No. 18 in Santa Tecia, also in El Salvador. He was the first Worshipful Master of this Lodge. Juan Jose Canas was also a member of a Chapter Rose Croix.



#### FRANK COCHRANE'S LATEST

Orange Blossom Lodge No. 80 celebrated its 100th anniversary on Jan. 22, 1985. During this period it has had five DDGM's and will have its first member to become a Grand Master in 1986. Orange Blossom was originally a full moon Lodge but changed to regular meeting nights. There is one full moon Lodge left in Florida - Orange Lodge No. 36 in Apopka. They meet on the Friday on or before the full moon.

#### SERBIA ANTI-MASONIC STAMPS ON COVER



Bro. John O. Welch, member No. 126, has provided this copy of a cover bearing the four Anti-Masonic stamps (Scott 2NB15-18) issued in 1942 by the German Nazi Government for use in Serbia. The surtax was used for anti-Masonic propaganda. These stamps, although intended to be Anti-Masonic, contain designs which are more directly Anti-Semetic.

This illustration is one of the special first day covers which were produced with the title of the event imprinted as shown. The first 1000 such covers were numbered and postmarked with a special "Golden Postmark". Covers that did not sell on the first day were sold for an indefinate period after Jan. 1, 1942, but were cancelled with regular black ink and were not numbered. The total number of covers is not known; however, the "Golden Postmark" covers are very scarce and the black postmark covers are hard to come by.



Whitney Moore Young was a member of Rescue Lodge No. 4 (Prince Hall), Omaha, Nebraska.

Whitney M. Young, an American educator, social work administrator and civil rights leader was born in Lincoln Ridge, Ky., on July 31, 1921. He received his B.S. degree at Kentucky State College in 1941 and his

#### EARL WARREN




Earl Warren was born in Los Angeles, California, on March 19, 1891, the son of a railroad mechanic. He attended public schools in Bakersfield and worked as a brakeman on freight trains in the San Jaoquin Valley. In 1912 he graduated from the University of California at Berkeley and two years later received his law degree there. Volunteering for active duty in 1917, he was assigned to the 363rd Infantry Regiment at Camp Lewis, Washington. He was a first lieutenant waiting his orders th France when the war was ended.

He practiced law in Oakland, California, and held local and state offices being elected to the first of three terms as district attourney of Alameda County in 1925. He rose steadily in the state's Republican organization winning election as attourney general in 1939. He was elected Governor in 1943 and served three terms in this office - an unprecedented feat in the history of the state. He took the oath of office as the 14th chief justice of the United States on Oct. 5, 1953, being appointed by Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower to succeed the late Frederick M. Vinson. He played a major role in the 1954 school segregation case clearing the way for the whole future of the civil rights movement. At the urging of his doctors and family, he resigned this office on June 23, 1969. He died at the age of 83 on July 9, 1974, in Washington, D.C., and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Bro. Earl Warren was a member of Sequoia Lodge No. 349, Oakland, Calif., being initiated on Oct. 11, 1919, passed on Oct. 15, 1919, and raised on Nov. 1, 1919. He served as Master of this Lodge in 1928. He continued his Masonic interests in Grand Lodge, taking office as Senior Grand Warden in 1933. A one-year term as Deputy Grand Master followed and in 1935 he became the 69th Grand Master of Masons in California.

He was a member of Oakland Royal Arch Chapter No. 36 and Oakland Commandery No. 11, K.T.. He joined the Scottish



Rite in Oakland in December 1919. He was Potentate of Aahmes Temple of the Shrine in Oakland in 1933-34. He was named a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor by the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction in 1937 and served as wise master of Rose Croix in 1938. He received the honorary 33° AASR (S.J.) on Dec. 23, 1941, and served as Venerable Master of the Lodge of Perfection during his first term as Gov. of Calif. He also was a member of St. Philip Conclave No. 23, Red Cross of Constantine.

#### THE WORLD'S OLDEST MASON?

One of the most outstanding gravestones in the world commemorates Bro. Chas. McCue, who was initiated in Lodge No. 38 in Antrim, No. Ireland, at the age of 18 years. He emigrated to Canada and joined St. John's Lodge No. 68 in Ingersoll, Ontario. When he died at the age of 113, he had been a member of the Craft for 95 years. The Lodge meets once a year at the grave for a brief service. An inscription on the gravestone states: "Erected in 1967 by the descendants of Charles McCue and his Masonic brethren of St. John's Lodge No. 68 A.F.& A.M.Ingersoll. A Tribute to the World's Oldest Mason.

Fraternal Member from 1775 to 1870". -from the 'Masonic Square"

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
