LAURA ELIZABETH INGALLS WILDER



The USPS release of four stamps on October 23, 1993, highlighting Youth Classics includes Little House on the Prairie and Adventures of Huckleberry Finn. The latter was written by Samuel L. Clemens, a Freemason who has been well documented, the most recent being on page 513 of the Nov-Dec 1985 Newsletter. The <u>Little House</u> series of books

was written by Laura Ingalls Wilder, an Eastern Star member.



The Little House books tell the story of Laura's life. She was born in 1867 in a little log cabin at the edge of a big woods in Wisconsin. Through the years she traveled with her family by covered wagon through Kansas, Minnesota and finally the Dakota Territory where she met and married Almanzo Wilder. There were years of want and hard work. Crops were lost to storms, fire and grasshoppers; but there were also the happy times of love and laughter. In 1894, Laura, Almanzo and their daughter, Rose, moved to Mansfield, Mo., - a town just developing in the Ozarks. They operated an apple farm there named "Rocky Ridge Farm" and also raised crops and animals. By 1911 she had become Editor for a couple of newspapers and organized the Mansfield Farm Loan Association. She and her husband decided to retire in 1929 and after prodding by her daughter, she started writing down the memories of her childhood. Her first book was published in 1932 and at age 65 was suddenly famous and beginning a new career. In 1943, at age 76, she published her last book. In October 1949 Almanzo passed away and she joined him seven years later - three days after her 90th birthday.

Laura Elizabeth Ingalls Wilder was an Eastern Star member with her parents and sister in De Smet, So. Dakota. On May 15, 1897, Mansfield Chapter #76, Mansfield, MO, was Instituted and Constituted. She affiliated with this Chapter and served as Esther that first year. She served as Worthy Matron three times, the first being in 1902 when Almanzo, her husband, was initiated into the Eastern Star. Both she and her husband were extremely active in the Order.

Bro. Norm Lincoln, our Research Chairman from Eaton, Ohio, has provided an excellent coverage of the Masons honored on the forthcoming 1994 USPS releases.

Silent Screen Stars - April

Rudolph Valentino, Charlie Chaplin, Lon Chaney and Buster Keaton were not Freemasons. Clara Bow married Rex Bell who was not a Mason. Zasu Pitts was a Roman Catholic and neither of her husbands were Masons.

John Gilbert is listed as a Mason in Denslow's 10,000 Famous Freemasons but no Lodge is mentioned. He was born July 10, 1897 in Logan, Utah. He

entered films in 1916 with the Triangle Company; after a number of films with Paramount and Fox, he joined MGM. "The Merry Widow" with Mae Murray directed by Eric Von Strohem made him a star. His next film, "The Big Parade" directed in 1925 by King Vidor is one of the best of all silent films. He was married to Leatrice Joy, Ina Claire and Virginia Brace but his real love was Greta Garbo who starred opposite him in four films. His voice did not suit his image as a great lover and he never succeeded in sound films. He died Jan. 9, 1936.

Harold Lloyd's career has already been profiled in The Philatelic Freemason (page 1045 - May/June 1993 and page 1083 - Nov/Dec 1993).

Theda Bara was born July 29, 1890, in Cincinnati, Ohio; her real name was Theodosia Goodman. William Fox (1879-1952) hired her for "A Fool There Was" in 1915. Fox's Masonic affiliation is unknown but he is believed to be a member of the Craft. Theda Bara appeared in 41 films as a "vamp". In 1921 she married Charles Brabin who was born in Liverpool, England, March 17, 1883. He was a member of Beverly Hills Lodge No. 528. Theda died on April 7, 1955, and her husband died in 1957. Although her career lasted only four years, she was arguably the first superstar of the movies.

The Keystone Kops included several members of the Fraternity:

Max Asher - born in 1879, member of Mt. Olive Lodge No. 506. Eddie Baker - Nov. 17, 1897 to Feb. 4, 1968, member of Cahuenga Lodge No. 513.

Billie Bevan - 1887-1957, listed as a member of the 233 Club of Hollywood.

Glen Cavender - Aug. 9, 1887 to 1962, member of Mount Olive Lodge No. 506.

Chester Conklin - 1888-1971, member of University Lodge No. 394. Fred Kelsey - 1884-1961, member and Past Master of Mt. Olive Lodge No. 506.

Hank Mann - 1887-1971, member of Mt. Olive Lodge No. 506.

There is no information yet uncovered of any Masonic membership of Ford Sterling, the most famous of the Kops.

Myers Hall Postal Card - March


Myers Hall at Whittenberg College was the home of Bro. Norman Lincoln in 1950-51. He was born in Preble County, Ohio, May 11, 1932. He earned a BA at Whittenberg in 1953 and an MEd from Miami in 1962. He served in the U.S.Army and then taught high school history. He is now a case worker for the Montgomery County Department of Human Services.



Bro. Lincoln was raised in Bolivar Lodge No. 82, is a Knight York Cross of Honor and Junior Deacon of the Ohio Lodge of Research. He is also a Past President of the Eaton Kiwanis Club and a member of the American Legion, National Society Sons of the American Revolution and the Odd Fellows. He collects and writes about Masons on stamps and Masons on records.

<u>Popular Signers</u> - September

Al Jolson has been cited earlier in connection with the talking pictures stamp of 1977. His show business career was considerably greater than that livelihood. Born Asa Yoelson May 26, 1886, in Srednick (St. Petersburg) Russia and died October 23, 1950, in San Francisco. He came to the U.S. when 7 years old, was reared in Washington, D.C., and made his first stage appearance there. In 1919 he joined Lew Dockstader's minstrel troupe and went on to perform in the circus, vaudeville, minstrels, revues, musical comedy, radio and films. He was a member of St. Cecile Lodge No. 568, New York - "The Actor's Lodge" - being raised on July 1, 1913.



Ethel Nerman was married (briefly) to Ernest Borgnine who was born May 24, 1915, in Hamden, CT. After serving in the Navy, he became an actor. He won an Oscar for "Marty" in 1954 and starred in the TV series "McHales Navy", 1962-66, and Airwolf, 1984-86. He was raised in Abington Lodge No. 48, Virginia, and is a member of Melrose Lodge No. 602, California. He is also a Shriner and a 33rd Degree Scottish Rite.

<u>Buffalo Solders</u> - April

Bro. Lincoln states that many of the "Buffalo Soldiers" belonged to a Regimental Lodge but defers to Bro. Joseph A. Walkes, Jr., for the information on this organization and these members.

Legends of the West - March

Jim Bridger, Chief Joseph, Bill Pickett, Bat Masterson, Wyatt Earp, Geronimo, Bill Hickock, Jim Beckworth and Bill Tilghman were not members of the Craft.

John C. Fremont (1813-1890), American explorer and army officer known as "the pathfinder" is often referred to as a Freemason but no proof of membership can be found. He was the son-inlaw of Thomas H. Benton, Civil War General who was raised in Iowa City Lodge No. 4, Iowa, in 1849 and served as Grand Master of Iowa 1860-62.

The Masonic career of William F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody has been well documented in previous issues of this Newsletter (pages 706, 718 and 791)

Charles Goodnight, model of the legendary Texas cattleman, was born in Illinois on March 5, 1836. His family went to Texas and settled near Cameron when he was nine years old. In 1857, he purchased 430 longhorns from his brother-in-law, Claiborne Varner, Charter Master of Waco Lodge No. 92. He drove his new herd up the Brazos to Palo Pinto County where he started his Black Springs Ranch. In 1860 he accompanied Captain Sul Ross and his Texas Rangers in their campaign against the Nocona Comanche on the Pease River.

During the Civil War he was assigned duty as a scout and guide with the frontier regiment fighting the plains tribes in northwest Texas. In 1866 he and Oliver Loving, "Father of the Texas Cattle-drive", became partners and pioneered the famous Goodnight-Loving Trail to New Mexico. He invented and designed the "chuck-wagon" for their first cattle-drive. His partner died at Fort Sumner, NM, and Bro. Goodnight returned the body to Weatherford, Texas, where a burial was performed by Phoenix Lodge No. 275. Loving had requested not to be buried in "foreign" soil. In 1876, with the Comanche finally on the Fort Sill Reservation, he moved his herd to the Palo Duro Canyon in the Texas Panhandle. Through the introduction of Hereford bulls, he developed one of the nation's finest herds with over 100,000 head on over a million acres. He died on Dec. 12, 1929.

Bro. Charles Goodnight became a member of Jacksboro Lodge No. 238 in 1863 and later affiliated with Belknap Lodge No. 274 and Phoenix Lodge No. 275 at Weatherford. In 1910 he affiliated with Goodnight Lodge No. 1015.




Kit Carson was born Dec. 24, 1809, in Madison County, Ky. While an infant, his parents moved to Howard County, Mo., which was then a wilderness. At the age of 15 he was apprenticed to a saddler but ran away two years later to join a party of hunters in Santa Fe, N.M. He lived the life of a plains trapper for eight years and then appointed hunter for the garrison at Bent's Fort for another eight. Next he served as guide for Gen. John C. Fremont. In 1851 he settled down to ranching near Taos and within a few years was appointed Indian Agent for Colorado Territory even though he was totally illiterate at the time. He become instrumental in bringing about treaties between the Indians and the U.S. At the age of 47 he dictated his memoirs and finally learned to read and write some time in his fifties. He died on May 24, 1868, as a result of an accident in which his horse fell on top of him. This fall resulted in a tumor which pressed on his trachea and led to hemorrhaging into his lungs - yet he smoked his clay pipe right up to the end.

Bro. Carson received his degrees in Montezuma Lodge No. 109 (under Missouri charter) receiving his degrees on March 29, June 17 and Dec. 26, 1854. When Bent Lodge No. 204 was chartered by Missouri in Taos on Dec. 15, 1859, he demitted to it on April 30, 1860, and became its first Junior Warden. This new Lodge surrendered its Charter in 1864 and in 1865, Carson again affiliated with his Mother Lodge and remained a member there until his death.

Bro. Lincoln has provided a copy of the Guyana souvenir sheet cited in the previous newsletter which depicts Bro. Cecil B. DeMille (upper right) and Bro. Paul Robeson (lower left - stamp misspells his name as Roebeson). Thank you for sharing this with us, Bro. Norm.

Ray Bidwell Collins (12/10/1889 - 7/11/1965) Appeared in 74 films after <u>Citizen Kane</u>; also played Lt. Tragg on Perry Mason Show on TV from 1955 to 1963. He was a member of Tehama Lodge No. 3 Sacramento, CA.

Carl Laemmle (1/17/1867 - 1939) "Carl Laemmle presents The Mummy." Head of Universal Studios 1912 to 1936. He was a member of Pacific Lodge No. 233, New York City.


William Fox (1879 - 1952) The Great K & A Train Robbery. Founded Fox Films. Was called a Mason but details not available.

MASONS IN SUPER BOWLS
St. Vincent has issued some "stamps" honoring professional football's Super Bowl. The souvenir sheet for Super Bowl I (1967) shows Bart Starr (No. 15), Green Bay Packers quarterback who is a member of Washington Lodge No. 21, Green Bay, WI. Ray Nitschke, also a member of the same Lodge, played middle line backer for the Packers. Weeb Ewbank coached Joe Namath and the New York Jets to victory in Super Bowl III - he is a member of Mount Moriah Lodge No. 37, Beverly, OH. Johnny Robinson, a member of Cass Lodge No. 147, Harrisonville, Mo, helped the Kansas City Chieftains defeat the Vikings in Super Bowl IV. Billy Ray Smith played defensive tackle for the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl III; he is a member of Mountain Pine Lodge No. 147, Henderson, Ark. This list exhausts Bro. Norm Lincoln's repertoire of professional football players in Super Bowls who were Masons.


IRELAND COVERS

CARL HAYDEN


Bro. Lincoln has sent in an interesting cover honoring Bro. Carl Hayden. He was born Oct. 2, 1877 in Tempe, AZ (formerly Hayden's Ferry) and died in 1972. He served as a member of town council of Tempe and treasurer and sheriff of Maricopa County. He served in the infantry in WW I. He entered Congress in 1912 when Arizona became a state and served there 57 years. Bro. Carl Hayden was a member of Tempe Lodge No. 15.



MASONIC ISSUE FROM ANTIGUA & BARBUDA

Bro. John M. Cunningham has provided a folder containing Masonic stamps issued by Antigua & Barbuda. The folder states that the stamps are to commemorate the 150th Anniversary of St. John's Lodge No. 492. The First Day for the stamps waas apparently August 16, 1993. The information I have learned to date is that they were most likely produced by the Inter-Governmental Philatelic Corp., 460 West 34th St., New York City. Letters to this firm have gone unanswered to date but I will continue to try for information so we can all acquire this issue.





SYMBOLS FROM PAPUA & NEW GUINEA
Papua & New Guinea issued a set of stamps on Feb. 8, 1967, to mark the commencement of higher education in the Territory. Each stamp contains symbols which can be interpreted to be Masonic in nature. The set comprises:








THOMAS R. MARSHALL

Another interesting cover sent in by Bro. Norm Lincoln can be used for Bro. Thomas R. Marshall. He was born on March 14, 1854, in North Manchester, IN, and died June 1, 1925. A Wabash College graduate he became a lawyer and Governor of Indiana in 1909. He was elected Vice-President of the United States in 1912. He is most famous for saying "What this country needs is a good five-cent cigar."



Bro. Marshall was raised in Columbia City Lodge No. 189, Columbia City, IN, on Sept. 5, 1881. He was also a Chapter, Council and Commandery member as well as being a 33rd Degree Scottish Rite. He served as Grand High Priest of Indiana in 1899 and Grand Illustrious Master of Indiana in 1895.
