NEW MASONIC ISSUE

Chile has issued the latest pure Masonic issue. A \$250 stamp and a \$1200 souvenir sheet were released on April 8, 1997, to commemorate 50 Years of the Interamerican Masonic Confederation. They were issued for the XVII Grand Assembly of this Organization held in Santiago, Chile, from April 9 to April 12, 1997.





The C.M.I. (Confederacion Masonica Interamericana) is the integration of 64 individual Grand Lodges, representing 21 Latin American countries. These are grouped into six zones: las Grandes Logias de la Republica Federal de Mexico; las Grandes Logias del Caribe; las Grandes Logias de Centro America; las Grandes Logias de la Parte Norte de Sudamerica; las Grandes Logias Brasilenas y las Grandes Logias del Cono Sur de Sud America.


TREASURER'S REPORT





MASONIC COMPUTER NIGHT - NEW ZEALAND






Information is now available on the St. John's Chapter No. 70 Bicentennial cover illustrated on page 1325 of the previous Newsletter; a total of 500 were printed. There is only one copy of a 1st Class signed cover available and four copies of a cover bearing 2nd Class postage - they sell for 1.75 Pound each (plus postage). There are several unsigned copies bearing 1st or 2nd Class postage available at 1.25 Pound each. Overseas postage is 40 Pound surface and 60 Pound airmail (for 1 to 5 covers). MASONIC COVER FROM BRAZIL

One of "The Stamp Act" readers has provided the cover shown here which was issued to commemorate the 30th Anniversary of Loja Masonica Roosevelt in 1977. The special cancel was also part of the celebration. The circular logo shows President Roosevelt in a triangle set in the East of a Lodge room; the text states "August and Respectable Lodge Roosevelt - Order of Bauru".



LEONCIO PRADO

Bro. Juan Sabater Pie has provided further information on the Masonic biography of Bro. Leoncio Prado to complement the article which appeared on page 1308 of the January-February 1997 issue. He states that Bro. Prado was initiated when he was 20 years old on March 3, 1873, in Friendly Lodge No. 239 in Kingston, Jamaica, under the jurisdiction of the United Grand Lodge of England. He was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in August 1876.

Two of the U.S. Internal Revenue Match & Medicine stamps picture the Square and Compasses and make an interesting addition to any Masonic stamp collection. The first, RO61, was prepared by the Henry A. Clark Co.; the second, RO106, was published by the Charles S. Hale Co. Your Editor managed to be able to acquire the copy shown here of the former one while in Tallahassee recently on business. Unfortunately, I did not have my inventory with me and did not realize that I bought a second copy of the one I already had. It is not a cheap stamp but if anyone is interested in acquiring it, let me know.




JOSHUA LAWRENCE CHAMBERLAIN

Joshua L. Chamberlain was born September 8, 1828, in Brewer, Maine. He attended Ellsworth Military Academy and graduated from Bowdoin College in 1852 and Bangor Theological Seminary in 1855. He spoke seven languages and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He was named Colonel of the 20th Maine Regiment in 1862, fought in 24 battles and was wounded six times. At Gettysburg, he led his Regiment in the defense of Little Round Top and was awarded the Medal of Honor. He received the surrender of Lee's forces at Appomattox from Bro. John Brown Gordon. Following the Civil War, Bro. Chamberlain was elected Governor of Maine and later served as President of Bowdoin College. He wrote several books on his military service. He was a member of United Lodge No. 8, Brunswick, Maine.






SIR DONALD BRADMAN

Further media coverage on this individual pictured on a recent pair of Australian stamps provides added data. He was born into a farming family in Yeo Yeo, NSW, on 27 August 1908. He learned to play cricket by throwing a golf ball at a water tank and hitting it with a stump. He made his first century at the age of twelve playing for Bowral School against Mittagong and was selected for his first test match against England in 1928.

Scoring as no one had ever scored before (or since), Bradman made his runs at the rate of 50 an hour and scored numerous single, double and treble centuries. He was remarkable for his nervous stamina, concentration and complete coolness in the face of crisis. Sir Donald Bradman is not simply the greatest cricketer the world has ever seen - to Australians he is more than this. He is considered a great Australian treasure. He helped establish Australia's identity - an ideal choice for the first Australian Legend.

Bro. Erhard Stermole provides a copy of a cover issued by the South Australia Grand Lodge to celebrate the Freemason's Grand Installation of John James Stone. The Australian Post cooperated by providing the commemorative postmark for use on April 5, 1997. They are sold by the South Australia Grand Lodge for AUD\$3.00 which includes local postage. PEDRO "PERUCHO" FIGUEREDO

A stamp issued by Cuba in 1970 pictures Bro. Pedro Figueredo, a noted Journalist and Cuban Revolutionary.



Bro. Figueredo was one of the organizers of the Revolutionary Committee of Bayamo of 1867 which started the national independence movement against Spain that became known as The Ten Year War. He participated in the occupation of Bayamo in 1868 and while there composed the current Cuban National Anthem known as the Bayames Anthem. The first stanza of this anthem states "To the combat will go Bayanenses, that the Country envisions you to be proud. Do not fear a glorious death, for to die for the Country is to live!" In reality, "Perucho" died for his country and his high libertarian ideals - he was captured by the Spanish troops and executed. He had been appointed Chief of State for Bro. Gen. Cespedes.

Luis Colom Delgado, in the article "Masonry and Independence" published in the magazine "Gran Logia" (January 1955), states that Bro. Figueredo was a member of a secret Lodge named "Estrella Tropical" No. 19 (Tropical Star) which also served as the spawning ground for the Revolutionary Committee.



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

As indicated above, there are several stamps that will be issued this year to commemorate the 100th Death Anniversary of Bro. von Stephan. These are in addition to a long list of world-wide postal releases already available. The stamp shown here is the one issued by Germany on April 8, 1997.



Heinrich von Stephan was a member of the Lodge "Teutonia zur Weisheit" in Potsdam, Germany. He was initiated there on October 28, 1858, passed on May 19, 1859, and raised on November 24, 1859. Born on January 7, 1831, in Stolp, Pomerania, he was the first Postmaster-General of the Greman Empire and the founder of the Universal Postal Union. He died April 8, 1897, in Berlin.

ALBERT A. MICHELSON



A stamp issued by Grenada in 1996 as part of a set for Nobel Prize Winners pictures Bro. Albert A. Michelson the scientist.

Bro. Michelson received his degrees in Washington Lodge No. 21, New York City, on Aug. 18, 1874, Dec. 31, 1875, and Jan. 21, 1876. At the time of his initiation he was a midshipman stationed on the U.S.S. Roanoke. He withdrew on Jan. 7, 1879.

Born on Dec. 19, 1852 in Strelno, Germany, he was a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy in 1873 and later attended the University of Berlin, the University of Heidelberg, the College of France and the Ecole Polytechnique. He was an instructor in physics and chemistry at the U.S. Naval Academy from 1875-79 and later served at the Case School of Applied Science, Clark University and the University of Chicago. He was also an exchange professor and lecturer at several European universities. He received the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1907 and died on May 9, 1931.

DAVY CROCKETT

The United States issued a stamp for Davy Crockett on August 17, 1967, at San Antonio, TX, where he died in the defense of the Alamo in 1836. Born on August 17, 1786, in Limestone, Tenn., this colorful trapper, hunter and Congressman from the backwoods is noted for his legendary exploits.



Crockett is often referred to as a Mason but no proof of his membership has been found. In 1897 it was claimed that a Mr. E. M. Taylor of Paducah, KY, was in possession of his Masonic Apron. On April 21, 1936, the Grand Lodge of Texas dedicated a Masonic memorial on the San Jacinto battlefield. The plaque on the memorial carried a list of 48 names, including that of Crockett, stating "A tribute to the fidelity of pioneer Masons under whose outstanding leadership was laid the cornerstone of the Republic of Texas."

SAMUEL LANGHORNE CLEMENS



Bro. Mark Twain has been pictured on several stamps issued by countries throughout the world. The U.S. issue shown here is part of the writers series of 1940.

Bro. Clemens was initiated in Polar Star Lodge No. 79, St. Louis, MO, on May 22, passed on June 12 and raised on July 10 - all in 1861. In Feb. 1865 he acted as Junior Deacon of Bear Mountain Lodge No. 76 at Angels Camp - a California mining camp.

It is my understanding that while the fraternal arm has either ceased to exist or atrophied into obscurity, Woodmen of the World, like a similar organization, the Independent Order of Foresters (IOF, don't confuse with IOOF, the Odd Fellows), began its existence as a fraternal organization. One of the benefits offered along the way in both organizations was insurance. Eventually, fraternal organizations became less popular, and the insurance division became something of a "normal" insurance company, but with social aspects, including causes, fundraisers for charity, etc. At this time, it also opened its doors to people who were not members of the fraternal organization, since not enough of those remained to keep the insurance company viable.

In the case of the Independent Order of Foresters, the original fraternal organization was (and I believe still is, but in much smaller form) strictly Roman Catholic. The insurance organization of the same name is not.

To those still interested; There are 3 fraternal organizations using the title, Woodmen of the World. The original was, "Modern Woodman" out of Rock Island, IL. and is still in operation. It was est.about 1870. It was a fraternal (men only) organization. It was inexpensive insurance to help with burial costs for many of the Civil war soldiers whose families could not afford a regular burial. About 1890, Woodman of Omaha and Pacific Woodman split off from the parent company, "Modern Woodmen". Woodman of Omaha is still in business and is one of the 4th largest insurance companies in the country. It covered the mid-central states. Pacific Woodmen, also still operating, covered the 9 western states of CA, OR, WA, NV, AZ, CO, WY, NM & ID. It is based in Littleton Colorado but, does business in other states under the name,: Insured investors Life". As far as historians and records go...I don't know anything about Modern Woodmen or Woodmen of Omaha but, Pacific Woodmen may have some records. I am checking now to see if the records have been put on computer. It does not have an official historian. This information came from my father-in-law who was on the board of directors for Pacific Woodman for 23 years. My brotherin-law currently works for Pacific Woodman and is trying to get more information for me.

In the meantime, if you have an ancestor with a Woodman of the World stone in Mid-Central states, check with Woodman of Omaha for records or, in the camps in the area where your ancestors are buried.



Sister group is The Degree of Pocahontas. Boys 8+ can be a member of the Degree of Hiawatha. A girl would be in the Degree of Anona.
